Allspice (Calycanthus floridus)

Origin: Southeastern North America. **Description:** Allspice, or Sweetshrub,

a fragrance similar to strawberries. **Uses:** Aromatic scent; espalier;

Harvest: Year round.

Flower: Spring to Summer flowering;

Tolerance: Moderate drought tolerance; poor salt tolerance; grows

in wide variety of soils.

General Description: Allspice, also known as Sweetshrub, Strawberry Bush, and Carolina Allspice, is a pleasant-smelling shrub native to Southeastern North America. Allspice can be found in USDA zone 5B through 10A, and is known to be tolerant of a wide variety of soils and environments. Allspice can reach a height of 10 feet and a spread of up to 12 feet at full maturity.



- Native Origin: Southeastern North America.
- General History: Allspice has been used as an ornamental for many years, either as a shrub or
 privacy screen. Although considered endangered in Florida, it is quite common in other
 southeastern states, and is hardly affected by any pest or disease.
- **Distrubution:** Zone 5B-10A; native to Southeastern North America.
- Season of Harvest: Year round.
- Culinary Uses: None; leaves and fruits used in potpourris and aromatic air fresheners.
